Pastor's Page

Greetings Summer Hill,

You have all heard the saying, "*If March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb.*" It's one of those things that we all seem to say but never really give much thought to its accuracy. Like many old folklore sayings, this one seems to have come from an ancient belief that there should be a balance between weather and life. So, if a month came in bad (roaring like a lion), it should go out good and calm (docile, like a lamb).

However, with March weather being so unpredictable, in which we can see warm springlike temperatures or late-season snowstorms, you can understand how this saying might hold true in some instances and other times not. We can only hope that if March starts stormy, it will end calmly, but the key word is *hope*.

Hope is also a keyword for the church liturgical season of Lent that begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5th. Lent is an ancient term initially associated with the approaching of springtime or the lengthening of the days, which gave hope to those who survived the brutal winters. Beginning around the 4th century, the observance of Lent became connected with a time of penitence and preparation before Easter. These forty days before the Christian faith's most sacred day (not counting Sundays!) have been kept ever since as a time for devotion and self-denial that comes forth from a faithful heart that dwells on God's Word and draws life and hope from it.

During the six Sundays in Lent, we will focus on the themes of temptation, God's mercy, the life of a disciple, the refreshment that God gives to his disciples, and the lordship of Jesus. These themes help us recognize that we all need the promise of hope fulfilled by Christ's resurrection on Easter morning. It has also become a part of our tradition to provide an opportunity for reflective worship during the middle of the week to help us prepare our hearts and minds for the deeper meaning of Holy Week and the Passion of Christ.

This year, our midweek Lenten series begins on Ash Wednesday, with the Imposition of Ashes and Holy Communion, and concludes on Wednesday, April 9, before Palm Sunday and the beginning of Holy Week. During our Wednesday Lenten Services, we will focus on the key points of what Jesus taught and explore how we can live out these teachings in our daily lives. We will use Adam Hamilton's The Message of Jesus: Words That Changed the World to guide our discussion. During this six-week study, we will examine the most important themes in Jesus's teachings, why they matter, and how they speak to us today, including Jesus's preaching on the Kingdom of God, the Sermon on the Mount, the parables, the "I am" sayings in John and more. Jesus's message is not only life-changing but world-changing. Although you certainly do not need the book during this study, you can purchase the book from any major bookstore if you want to study more on each topic.

On Sunday mornings, the adult Generation's Sunday School class will dive even deeper into these lessons with interactive discussions on how we can apply them in our lives. Come and join us on this spiritual journey through Lent as we travel to Jerusalem with Jesus and the disciples, through Holy Week and to the cross, and then witness anew Christ's resurrection and the hope we receive for eternal life.

STEWARDSHIP

It cannot be said enough. St. Paul's Summer Hill UCC is very blessed to have such a faithful and generous community of faith supporting our ministries. While we hear about the increasing number of church closures due to declining membership, attendance, and giving, St. Paul's is thriving and committed to being a beacon of light shining Christ's love to all.

Our membership is steady, our worship attendance is rebounding, and our giving has increased year on year during some of the most difficult economic times we have seen in decades. We all should praise God for the gifts we have been given and entrusted with.

A recent study on giving to church ministries revealed:

- A generation ago, regular church attendance meant attending worship weekly, while missing church only a few times a year for vacation or sickness. While today, regular attendance means attending once a month.
- During the 1950s, churches received 70% of all charitable contributions, but that declined to about 50% in the 1980s and today churches only receive 27% of all charitable donations.
- Before the pandemic, the vast majority of church giving on a national level was in person with cash or check, whereas today, 49% of giving comes by electronic means.

These and many other trends affect how churches continue to be communities of faith. Long gone are the days when the church was the social center of the community, and congregations were trying to figure out how to spend all the money they had been given. The biggest challenge for most churches today is how to keep the lights on and doors open instead of planning a church building expansion project.

St. Paul's Summer Hill ended 2024 in good fiscal health. Unlike some churches, we do not have a large endowment to draw upon, so we are dependent on the gifts from our members. Although we fell short of our budget for general weekly giving by \$20K, we were able to make up the difference with fundraisers, special gifts, and drawing upon some investments and savings in order to remain positive for the year.

We all hope economic forces will improve in the coming year, and the Consistory will continue to take any appropriate cost savings measures available, but we still need the help from our members in order to be able to continue providing ministries to our community.

Our year end budget report showed that overall giving to the general fund increased 5% during 2024, which is great, although less than the increased cost of expenses.

We found that the top 20% of our giving units (33) contributed 74% of our total budget or about \$75 per week per giving unit. We praise God for their generosity and are so grateful for their dedication to St. Paul's.

This also tells us that 80% of our giving units (123), contributed only 26% of our budget, or \$45,651 for an average of about \$7 per week per giving unit. 35 giving units gave less than a dollar a week.

While many of those in the 80% may already be giving as much as they can, our biggest potential to meet our budget in 2025 lies within this group. If even half of this group could give at least \$10 a week more than last year, we would easily recover from our current deficit and meet our 2025 budget.

So, the message is clear! We need your help! Every member of St. Paul's is important and needed to keep our ministries going. Every gift is important. Remembering to give your weekly offering to the church, even on those Sundays when you cannot be here in person, is important.

Please prayerfully consider how you can help us meet our 2025 goals by increasing your giving by whatever amount God has enabled you to give. No one will know how much that is, except you and God. But we will all be thankful for every gift!

The Lenten Desert

During the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 5 this year), Christians figuratively follow Jesus into the desert. Just as our Savior spent 40 days fasting and facing temptation, we focus on self-reflection and contrition.

In an 1873 hymn, Claudia Hernaman wrote, "O Lord, throughout these forty days, you prayed and kept the fast. Inspire repentance for our sin, and free us from our past."

The desert experience of Lent serves a clear purpose, filling us up rather than depleting us. "This is what Lent is meant to be," writes theologian Ron Rolheiser. "Time in the desert to courageously face the chaos and the demons within us and to let God do battle with them through us. The result is that we are purified, made ready, so the intoxicating joy of Easter might then bind us more closely to God and each other."

Fasting and Feasting

During Lent, consider this practical — and biblical — advice from Arthur Lichtenberger, a former presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church:

- Fast from criticism, and feast on praise.
- Fast from self-pity, and feast on joy.
- Fast from ill-temper, and feast on peace.
- Fast from resentment, and feast on contentment.
- Fast from jealousy, and feast on love.
- Fast from pride, and feast on humility.
- Fast from selfishness, and feast on service.
- Fast from fear, and feast on faith.
